## **Bios**



Garlia recently graduated with a B.A. in Theatre & Drama and English from Indiana University. She is currently working on her Masters in African American and African Diaspora Studies, and is applying for an MFA in Playwriting and Fiction. Her thesis, a self-written play, *Against the Grain*, will be premiering at the John Waldron Arts Center in February, 2007. She would like to give thanks to God, her amazing parents and friends for their constant love and support.

**Hillary Anne Scharmann**, a born performer, originally came to the IU Jacobs School of Music as a double major in voice and theatre. A native of Chicago, IL, her talents are versatile for she has been a member of IU ensembles from the Singing Hoosiers to the African American Choral Ensemble. Her involvements exceed the art community for she contributes time to GLBT programs as a vibrant speaker. On the side, she has taken up event planning with Off Beat Events. 




**Jamaal "Versiz" May** is a poet, producer, rapper and recording engineer. He is a two-time Detroit Poetry Slam champion and two-time Individual World Poetry Slam finalist. Jamaal is a Broadside Press Jury Prize winner and a Cave Canem Fellow. He has work-shopped with Thomas Sayers-Ellis, Patricia Smith, Lucille Clifton and former US Poet Laureate and Pulitzer Prize winner Rita Dove among others. Jamaal is the first hip-hop artist to ever be featured by The Detroit Symphony Orchestra in its 91-year history. He received two nods in Metro Times' Best of 2005 Music Issue. Production/Engineering credits include The Last Poets, Keith Washington, The Four Tops, Professor Grif of Public Enemy and M-1 of Dead Prez. Jamaal has shared stages with KRS-One, Saul Williams, Proof of D12, The Last Poets, Kathleen Battle, Al Sharpton Slum Village, One Be Lo, Jessica Care Moore and others.

# Note from Speaker

#### William Brawner

My name is William Brawner. I am 26 years old, and my entire life has been tailored around my diagnosis, as I have been HIV positive for 25 years. At 18 months of age I was severely burned requiring a blood transfusion, at which time I contracted the virus. Since I've been positive for over two decades, I have endured the harsh side effects of many medications including dangerously high fevers, night sweats, and stomach aches. Unfortunately, medication side effects are not the worst aspect of living a positive life.

As a result of stigma and discrimination, my immediate family and I agreed that I would not disclose my HIV status. This entailed keeping it a secret from relatives, friends, and girlfriends. When I turned 18 and wanted to become sexually active, not disclosing started to become an issue. It was difficult not having any support other than family and doctors, and I had no idea how to go about telling anyone that I was HIV positive. Finally, after becoming increasingly sexually active and convicted about not disclosing my status, I felt compelled to leap out on faith. My high school sweetheart was my first girlfriend to ever know that I was positive, and this ended as a disaster when she sent an email to my university's Assistant Vice President stating that I was infecting everyone in the school. My heart hit the floor and I vowed never to tell another soul.

After this, I developed what is commonly known as the "Superman Syndrome", I felt invincible. My counts were good, I was young and good-looking, and women loved me. In my mind, the virus was no longer a part of my life because I believed I had beaten HIV, and with this belief my behavior became reckless. Despite knowing my status I was very promiscuous, and even though most of the time I was extremely careful, sometimes after a few drinks and marijuana I lost my negotiation skills and fell to sexual pressures. After a period of time I was able to notify people that they needed to be tested, and to my knowledge I never infected anyone; however, not everyone is as fortunate.

Understand that not everyone is comfortable with themselves and their HIV status. Many HIV positive people may engage in risky sexual activity for a number of reasons including denial, a desire to be accepted, or because they don't even know their status. We are all responsible for own health and safety. If you have sex before marriage be sure to always use a condom, and know that it is okay to question your partner about his or her status. However, be mindful that people may not always be honest. Take control of your own destiny by getting tested, and encourage the people you know to do the same. As the new face of HIV/AIDS, my goal is to provide others with the knowledge and skills necessary to stop AIDS!
